

In preparing to write my Annual Review article I looked back at my article from last year. I saw achievements and wondered how we could top it. But I'm pleased that for this, the 4th Annual Report to the membership, I can say that we topped the previous year. 

INCOME AND REVENUE OVERVIEW

The association had a very productive year financially, regarding revenue generation and growth for 2016. The total revenue generated in 2016 came in slightly under the previous year, due to the changes to our deed destriction fines process. With this said, we had a record year for in house collection efforts, bringing in \$163,000.00 and ending with revenue 3% higher than the projected budget. These collection efforts resulted in 26 attorney reclaimed accounts being paid in full and 199 payment plans paid in full. The accounting department processed over 13,104 credit card, echecks, and debit and check payments in 2016. Due to a streamlined accounting process and the ability to create accurate financials in a timely manner has allowed our management team to be more proactive.

EXPENSE OVERVIEW

The association ended 2016 with an overall budget savings of \$86,826.00 over what was budgeted for in 2016. This year, we came in under budget in 8 out of 10 categories. Using careful analysis and competitive bids, our managers strive to obtain quality services/goods for our community while not compromising the quality. This has allowed us to keep our expenses lower and under budget. As a result, the Association can contribute more funds to MR&R funds to ensure continued enhancements and improvements to our facilities and our community.





One of the most exciting things that the Great Northwest offers is access to our beautiful lodges. This past year, Callanen Hall housed 98 parties with over 16,350 guests, while Flores Hall had 54 parties with over 2,750 guests in attendance. In the summer months, the Silver Creek and Emerald Valley pools had 73 parties in three months.

DEED RESTRICTIONS



Due to our standards and related benefits of living in a deed restricted community, in 2016 our Deed Restriction and Architectural Control (DRACO) Department issued 9,042 notices. Of these, 8,226 violations were corrected. That is a 90% correction rate for the year. The city of San Antonio code and compliance for the district also helps maintain the city ordinances throughout the seven subdivisions in the Great Northwest. SAPD also helps the deed restriction officers with any violation on GNW city streets.

DEED RESTRICTED COMMUNITY PERKS

Isn't it nice driving through the Great Northwest and not seeing construction debris? Don't you enjoy the beautifully landscaped yards on your street? There are numerous benefits of living in a deed restricted community:

KNOW YOUR GNW RESTRICTIONS

Living in a deed restricted community has it's perks, but there are responsibilities, too.

- Know the restrictions for your specific subdivision. The
 Great Northwest contains 18 sections, with each section
 containing its own set of restrictions per subdivision,
 although there is a common thread throughout. There are
 seven subdivisions in the Great Northwest.
- Assist in maintaining the quality of life in your neighborhood by adhering to the restrictions.

Community standards are outlined in the CC&Rs and Design Criteria. Administering these documents ensure that these standards support and enhance the atmosphere, and value of property in the community. The standards are administered by the deed restriction officer who is the main staff liaison with owners who may have violations on their property.

In keeping up the standards, the ACC received and reviewed 183 applications. Of that number 175 applications were approved and 8 were denied. The estimated improvements for the approved projects were \$2,070,928.

ARCHITECTURAL CONTROL COMMITTEE (ACC)

All owners are responsible for submitting an application before they begin an exterior improvement project. Submitting the details of such projects for review by the Architectural Control Committee is a true benefit for the homeowner as the ACC is knowledgeable about all the rules and covenants that govern such improvements. If there are problems the ACC can help homeowners avoid or correct them with this pre-project review.

WHY DO WE NEED AN ACC?

The goal of the Association is to make all homeowners fully aware of the community's architectural standards so as to minimize confusion and violations of the standards, while maximizing compliance and understanding. The Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions of the Great Northwest mandate the existence and functions of the Architectural Control Committee. The ACC's primary function is to maintain and enhance the appearance of the GNW by reviewing and approving or disapproving proposed

changes to existing exterior structures within the GNW. The committee interprets and applies the governing documents and Exterior Design Criteria. The committee is independent of the Board; however, the Board confirms committee members and has a vested interest in the activities and rulings of the committee. Cooperation and communication between the committee and the Board is essential. The ACC works closely with the Deed Restrictions and Architectural Control Officer and the Community Manager in performing its tasks.

- The ACC consists of 5 persons appointed by the Board of Directors.
- All appointees must be knowledgeable of, and in compliance with, the architectural standards.
- The ACC meets every other week to review submitted applications.
- The ACC members owe a duty to the Association to act in good faith and generally to refrain from voting on issues directly related to themselves, relatives or personal friends.

ATHLETIC LEAGUES

POOL STAFF


The Recreation Department can never be too busy. Along with events and sports, there is also the responsibility for the management of the pools, which includes personnel management, Barefoot Café management, and the organization of our Swim Instruction Program. From May to September, the Recreation Department grows from 1 employee to 30 employees. We have some of the most loyal, competent and caring summer staff members that you will ever meet. These young men and women are a great addition to the Great Northwest staff family during the summer months.

VOLUNTEERS

The backbone of everything we do in the Recreation Department are the volunteers. The Security department began 2016 sporting a new 2016 Toyota Tacoma and, as the community has seen, we changed our uniforms. We went to black slacks and changed our shoulder patch to show our new GNW logo. We still continue to provide 24/7 patrol coverage, residential services, as well as security for the Association's facilities.

RESIDENT SERVICES

In 2016 our community experienced a year in which crime was up. This was a trend that occurred throughout our city and the country. As we continue to support the community in other ways (residential services) as we will mention below, we make every effort to educate the community in securing their property and taking precautions to ensure their property is secured.

- Calls Made to Security: We made 1,847 calls last year, which was slightly up at 1.1%. This tells me the community is continuing to be involved with what is happening in their immediate neighborhood.
- Out of Town Home Checks: We made 4,847 checks to members' homes while they were out of town—a drop of 3.9%. Please inform us when you are out of town and we will gladly watch your homes.
- Special Watch Checks: We made 723 checks, which is also down by 12.6%. I consider this a good number. People in the community are having fewer issues with people in their lives.
- All Other Residential Services: We were up 7.4%. This tells me that our department is getting our message out about the services we provide.
- **Deed Restriction Notifications:** Our department assists the DRACO Department with enforcement in violations concerning vehicles, trailers, oversize vehicles and parking on grassy areas of yards. We were up 15.2% in the notices that we wrote and delivered to residents.
- Safety Awareness Notices: Safety notices are not violation notices, thus no mandatory actions are required. Of course, be mindful of the notice the safety issue has identified and take actions to correct it. This is for the safety of you and your family.

COMMUNITY SAFETY

Let's get into what I, and most others, consider the most important item to be discussed. **Crime in the community.** To assist in making our community safer, the Security Department continues to have a strong relationship with the San Antonio Police Department (SAPD), allowing them to engage with the Great Northwest community.

Our community continues to be very low on violent crime. Most violent crime we see comes from family members. All other violent crimes are uncommon in our community (knock on wood). If there was ever a spike in violent crime of any nature, SAPD would be very active in covering it.

Let's talk about the spike in crimes we had last year:

- Burglary of Resident/Buildings: We do not believe this year's 4% increase is a trend. We have pretty much leveled off from the highs of a few years back. Continue to be vigilant and notify Security when you noticed suspicious activity or people in the area.
- Burglary of Vehicles: We had a large increase of 59.4%. Is this a concern? Yes. However, 17 of these vehicle burglaries happened over a Friday and Saturday period. Without that anomaly, we would have been up about 13.5%. This is still too high and is an area we need to work on. Between residents, neighborhood watch (GNWatch), C.O.P., Dog Walker Watch volunteers, and the Security Department, I believe we can have a positive effect on this number next year. Remember, do not leave anything easily seen in your vehicles and always secure your property. Doing those two things will reduce vehicle burglaries.
- Thefts: We were up by 15.2%. Most thefts are from items being stolen from residents' backyards, or from items that are located in the front yard, such as landscape ornaments, potted plants, bicycles and personal items like cell phones. Please secure your items and make it difficult for thieves.

These areas can be managed in a positive way by educating the public, the GNW Teams and Committees working side by side with the Security Department. Please continue to report suspicious activities, persons and vehicles that are in the neighborhood. Let's reduce these areas of crime in our community.

Ball Moss - Friend or Foe?

A frequent site on our local Oaks and Persimmon trees is ball moss (Tillandsia recurvata). Contrary to popular belief ball moss is not a parasite; it is an epiphyte, a plant that attaches to another plant but derives its nutrients and water from the atmosphere. These are also called air plants and are commonly sold commercially. Other examples of epiphytes are orchids, lichen, and some ferns. While it is generally in the shape of a "ball" it is not a moss. It is a type of bromeliad that actually has roots and blossoms. ball Moss is spread through bird droppings and seed dispersal by the wind.

There are several theories that ball moss can harm trees even

though it is not a parasite. One is that the roots of the ball moss can strangle the branches, particularly inner, weaker branches, so it cannot receive the proper nutrients allowing the branch to die. Another is that a massive invasion blocks enough sunlight so that photosynthesis cannot take place and that it also prevents new buds from forming.

I try to manually remove as much of the ball moss as I can reach and rely on a good Texas windstorm to help out with the top branches. There are commercial tree services that will remove ball moss as well. Kocide 101 can be applied but read the warnings and follow directions very carefully. There is anecdotal literature on using baking soda to

remove ball moss but it is not listed on the baking soda label so it is not recommended by the experts.

Some people think the ball moss provides a certain character to a tree and others that consider it an unsightly pest plant. Some crafters view it as a source of supplies. I have seen ball moss spiders at Halloween and ball moss wreaths at Christmas.

So is it a quirky native species or a potential threat? It's up to you to decide.

Here's hoping those April showers will bring May flowers. Happy Gardening!

A Good Night's Sleep in the Great Northwest: Take Care of Your Mattress

The mattress is one of the most used household items, and if you are like me, it doesn't get cleaned very often. I figured that if I changed the sheets regularly, that should take care of it. The next time you change your sheets, pull off your mattress pad and take a look at what lies beneath. See a few stains? Maybe a whiff of something strange? It could be perspiration seeping into the mattress, or dead skin cells, or even mites that burrow into the mattress.

Here are a few tips to help you get a better night's sleep.

FLIP THE MATTRESS.

This will extend the life of the mattress and prevent sagging. During the process, move the bed frame, vacuum or sweep the floor underneath, and clean the bed frame.

GET RID OF THE ODORS.

Try using baking soda and essential oils. Pour 1 cup of baking soda into a bowl and add a few drops of

your favorite oil. Rub the mixture into the mattress and let sit for 1 hour. Vacuum it up and and enjoy the freshness. This process eliminates the dust mites which are too small to see but can like in your mattress.

GET BLOOD STAINS OUT.

Blot the stained area with a wet cloth to remove any excess blood. Then blot it with a dry cloth. Mix together a half-cup cornstarch, 1 tablespoon salt, and a quarter-cup hydrogen peroxide. Apply the paste to the stain, and let it dry completely. Scrape away the dried paste and vacuum.

CLEAN URINE STAINS.

Blot the stained area with a cloth to remove any excess urine. Make a solution of one part vinegar to one part water. Spray it on the stain, and let sit for five to 10 minutes. Cover entire area with baking soda. Let stand for eight to 10 hours. Vacuum up the baking soda. how it works. Sweet Dreams.
