Linear Creek Pathway Coming to the Great Northwest

We have the opportunity to connect our GNW owned greenbelt to the Howard Peak Linear Creek Parks Trail System at Cathedral Rock Park. The project will include a multifunction city services substation (to probably be used by Parks Police, SAPD) on Tezel Road adjacent to our Greenbelt. This trail connection will begin at the substation, proceed through the GNW Greenbelt, travel un-

GREAT NORTHWEST TENNIS Coach Bill Jaume Brings Tennis to GNW

Meet the coach behind the Great Northwest's newest fitness program -- Tennis.

Bill Jaume didn't start out playing tennis. In fact, he started out in martial arts at the young age of four. When he was 12, he started cross-training in tennis in Forest Hills, New York. Admittedly, he wasn't very good when he started out, "I played against other players and got beat all the time. It was a long time before I won a match." Despite his losing streak, Bill stuck it out. Eventually, an older mentor suggested he try different techniques and movements, and eventually he caught on.

Still, Bill didn't begin coaching the sport until much later, and he certainly didn't spend his days working on the tennis court. Instead, Bill spent three and a half years in the Marine Corps where he also received a degree in electrical engineering. After leaving the military, Bill spent another four or five years working in computer science before going back to school to study criminal law and medicine. Eventually, he found himself working in the emergency field until 1997, when an injury forced him to take four years off.

During that time, he found himself coming back to tennis. In the late 1970's, Bill began coaching when his foster son began playing the sport. "I started taking formal coaching classes to become a coach because I wanted to help him." His son became a part of the Tennis Ambassadors program, allowing him to travel around the world playing tennis. His son's involvement in the Tennis Ambassadors program motivated Bill to become more involved in tennis and coaching. Once his daughters began softball, however, Bill took a break from tennis to focus on coaching fast-pitch softball. In fact, it was not until 1993, when Bill's

DECISIONS MADE OR ACTIONS TAKEN BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS:

June 15 Regular Board Meeting The Board:

Decided to put the cost of the member ID machines, which are \$6,000, into the MR&R Schedule, effective in 2017

July 20 Regular Board Meeting

Chairwoman Rodkey, Vice Chairman Stallings, and Directors Guido, Fernandez, and Zoller signed the Director Code of Conduct and Oath of Office. Director Stives requested time to further review the code.

The Board:

Decided to set the expense threshold over which repairs and replacements are paid to \$5,000 (previously \$3,000).

August 3 Executive Board Meeting The Board:

Directed staff to send three deed restriction violation files to small claims court; send one file a 30-day final letter, then, if the violation is not cured, to Small Claims Court; and one file required more time before taking action.



Linear Creeks Trail in the Greenbelt

 As you may have already read, the City has proposed a plan to extend the Linear Creek Park walking trail into our Greenbelt. At the August Board meeting residents showed up to voice their opinions on the proposed proiect, some of the concerns included security

and parking.

The trail is a good amenity to the neighborhood, in my opinion, but there are concerns that must be addressed before the project moves forward. To that end, the Chairperson invited the residents in attendance to participate in a committee to gather facts and research the pros and cons of the project. The folks who showed up made very compelling arguments supporting their concerns and I hope the feedback continues and we do all we can to mitigate the risks expressed.

This is not a "position" paper on the project. I am a Board member Γ who doesn't live on the greenbelt and, while I think it may be a good amenity to the neighborhood, I also want to hear what the neighbors most effected have to say. So my request to you is, attend any and all information meetings on this subject. Hear the pros and cons, bring your own input, and participate in healthy discussion about the proposed expansion of the trail into our neighborhood. Whatever your opinion is as you read this, be open to listen and understand both sides of the proposal. If we can work together and mitigate everyone's concerns this may well be a good idea. If we can't get to a point where everyone is satisfied with the proposal, maybe it wasn't as good an idea as I thought. As the Councilman said at the meeting, it is a "neighborhood decision." I would encourage you to participate in the process, gather as many facts as you can and have your voice heard. This is not a fight, there are no good people and bad, this is just a process to gather as much feedback as we can and make a good decision for the neighborhood. This is how the process is supposed to work.



youngest son began playing tennis as a recreational sport, that Bill began focusing strictly on tennis. He started coaching again, and hasn't stopped since. Eventually, in 2002, after his four year hiatus from the workforce, Bill began coaching full-time.

Bill's passion about tennis becomes clear to anyone who speaks to him. While we spoke, Jaume gave me a brief history on the sport, from traditional to modern tennis, how tennis rackets evolved, and important figures in tennis such as Martina Navratilova and Christine Evert. He explained that the sport now incorporates sports science and psychology. With modern science and improvements, people are now able

to play tennis into their late 30s. "The science of the body in motion has advanced the sport," Jaume says. The constantly evolving sport also requires coaches to constantly update their knowledge.

Bill has received national and international coaching certifications. He has a long list of coaching certifications from the United States Tennis Association, Incorporated (USTA) and the International Coaches Institute. Because the sport is constantly evolving, Bill continues to take coaching courses in order to stay current.

About the Program

Classes will be held Monday through Thursday after school, at the Silver Creek Tennis Courts, between 3:30 pm and 7 pm, for ages 5 through 14. Adult classes will also be held on Wednesdays at 9 am. Register before October 1 to receive a discount on registration fees.

What will students learn?

Beginners can expect to learn the basics before anything. "I have to teach hand-eye coordination, how to move, how to cross/uncross your feet. You have to learn to walk and run."

Once a student learns the basic, then Bill focuses on the mental aspects of the game. "Tennis is a mental sport. You have to problem solve, plan, strategize, and at the same time you need to use your body to the best of its ability."

While the class teaches techniques and the mental aspects involved in Tennis, he also stresses the importance of health, diet and hydration. Bill explains that anticipation is important on and off the court. In particular, students have to anticipate the conditions they may be exposed to the next day. Bill teaches students to hydrate and eat healthy, not just the day of, but also the day before practice.

What will students gain from this program?

Bill's goal for his youth tennis programs as a mean to get a college education through tennis scholarships. He hopes that tennis and its mental strategies will be a guide throughout their life, through college and beyond. Plus, the courses helps youth learn the important of diet and how to eat.

Most of all, Bill hopes that when his students go on to start careers, tennis is the anchor that reminds them of who they are and where they came from. After all, "Tennis gives you something that you can carry throughout your life, and can bring you back to who you are."

BANDIT SIGNS

by Jose Morlett Deed Restriction and Architectural Control Officer (DRACO)

Every issue, I will highlight the most serious, and frequently given notices in the Great Northwest for the month. This month, we have given out several notices regarding Bandit signs. Below are the City Ordinance and the Great Northwest Deed Restriction on the signs.



BANDIT SIGNS CITY CODE 28-152

Signs illegally placed on city right of way or utility poles. Signs will be removed and disposed. Cases will be filed in Municipal Court against business sign owner.

GREAT NORTHWEST DEED RESTRICTION SECTION 6.9 SIGNS AND ARTICLE XII

(a) Political Signs:

(1) Only one sign per candidate or ballot item pertaining to the precinct the homeowner resides in.

(2) Signs cannot be put up prior to ninety (90) days before the election in question and must be taken down by the tenth (10th) day after the election.

(3) Signs must be ground mounted.

(b) Commercial or Professional Signs:

(1) Sign may be put up five (5) days prior to the work commencing and must be removed no later then five (5) days after work is completed.

(2) Signs must be ground mounted.

(c) Real Estate Signs:

(1) Only one sign per property.

(2) Sign must be ground mounted

(3) Signs noting that the property has been sold or leased must be removed no later than five (5) days after the sale or lease.

(d) All other types of signs, posters, etc. are prohibited

Things Every Homeowner Should Know About Their Home

Your home takes care of you—it keeps you warm, safe, well-fed—so it has every right to act a little highmaintenance and demand some TLC in return. Neglect your house, and there could be hell to pay later in the form of floods, electrical outages, and worse. So as a sort of

test, ask yourself if you know these things about your home.

Where is the main water shut-off valve?

Every home is different, but you can likely find your main valve near the perimeter of your house, at ground level, nearest your water meter. Imagine bathroom, kitchen, laundry room. They're all connected by a network of pipes. If any pipes springs a leak, you'll need to shut off the water until it can be fixed.

Where is your circuit box, and is it properly labeled?

A circuit box is your house's bodyguard against sudden spikes in electricity that runthrough the wires. Most circuit boxes are located in a house's garages or utility closets. The switches inside correspond to rooms and sets of outlets in your home. Hopefully, they're labeled properly—and if not, take the time to identify them.

Where are all your filters, and when was the last time they were replaced?

Lots of appliances in your home have filters. In fact, any device that conducts air or water should have some sort of filter in place to remove impurities and particulates. Changing these filters routinely can save you money, and keep you safe, which is why it's helpful to know when they're due to be replaced. Furnace filters should be replaced every two to three months; HVAC, ice maker, and water dispenser filters must change at least once a year. But that varies based on the manufacturer, so be sure to check your maintenance manual and not let it slide.

Fall Gardening

Looking forward to cooler temperatures and Fall Gardening.

For your vegetable garden consider broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, and Kale that grow best in cool weather, but they need to be started earlier and transplanted into the fall. There are also vegetables you can seed into a fall garden, like broccoli raab, chard, lettuce, peas and spinach.

For color chrysanthemums are always a favorite and available in autumn tones. Marigolds are another popular choice. They are the traditional flower of Dia de los Muertos celebrated November 1st.. Marigolds also supply the benefit of repelling Mexican bean beetles, squash bugs, thrips, tomato hornworms, and whiteflies. They are also known to repel harmful root knot nematodes (soil dwelling microscopic white worms) that attack tomatoes, potatoes, roses, and strawberries. Surround your vegetable garden with a border of marigolds for the double benefit of fall color and pest prevention.

Oak Wilt Disease

Oak Wilt disease is endemic in Central Texas including the San Antonio area. It affects Live Oaks and Red Oaks in particular. Oak Wilt is caused by a fungus (*Ceratocystis* fagacearum) spread by Nitidulid beetles through open wounds in the tree. Once a tree is infected it can spread to other nearby trees

through interconnected and grafted roots. Tips to prevent Oak Wilt (from <u>http://texasoakwilt.org/2011/</u> <u>pruning-guidelines-for-prevention-of-oak-wilt-in-texas/</u>) include :

- Always paint fresh wounds on oaks, including pruning cuts and stumps, with wound dressing or latex paint immediately after pruning or live tree removal at all times of the year.
- Clean all pruning tools with 10% bleach solution or Lysol™ between sites and/or trees.
- If possible avoid pruning or wounding of oaks during the spring (currently defined as February 1 through June 30).

Back to School Safety

Yes, it is unbelievable; school began on August 28, 2017. It seems just like yesterday we were discussing about the children getting out of school for the summer. Here are some things to remember in

the back-to-school season:

School Zones

Remember when driving in "School Zones", we all need to be careful and watch for the children. The speed limit is 20 M.P.H. in these areas. Observe these speed limits and watch very closely for children crossing the street. Please do not talk or text on your cell telephones while in the school zones. This is the law.

Walk with Your Children

On the first day or two of school, I recommend parents walk with their children to school and explain important safety practices. This is especially important for the first graders who have not ever experience this before. The number one thing to teach your children is to only cross the street at the crosswalks. Show them the way you want them to go and what intersections and crosswalks they are to use.

Be Aware of Peer Pressure

Parents of middle school and high school, beware of the peer pressure your kids will be under. Monitor your kids very closely during this phase of their life. The peer pressure to drive recklessly, drink and drive, do drugs, and other activities that can place them in harm's way will be overwhelming. Ask about the what, when, where, and with whom. Knowing these things can make a big difference.

School Bus Safety

Even though the school bus driver gives safety information to the kids, reiterate the importance of looking at the bus driver prior to walking in front the bus. They need to make sure the driver sees them. Prior to crossing the street they need to look for on-coming traffic (coming around the bus or coming in the opposite direction). Even though vehicles are supposed to stop for these school busses that don't mean all vehicles will. This leads me to a very important item....

Educating Your Children About Strangers

Take time to discuss with your children the importance of not getting into vehicles or leaving with strangers. This cannot be stressed enough. Children are naturally very trusting toward people. It is up to you to make sure they understand that at no time is it permitted to leave or get into a vehicle with a stranger. This also includes while at a park, shopping mall or just walking down the street.

Residential/Home Alarms and their Required Permits



WHAT IS YOUR BACKGROUND?

I spent 30 years working with AT&T as a project manager. I ran a call center, and saved the company an average of \$22 million a year. I retired in 2010, and have been very happy. The main thing I am very proud of is the volunteer work I have been doing with

the San Antonio Police Department. I was a police advisor and I trained Police Explorers from the age of 14 through 20 to become police officers. Right now, there are 21 former Police Explorers who are working for SAPD. Another five or six are working for Bexar County because SAPD was no longer hiring. As soon as they get the change, they will go.

WHAT IS THE MOST CHALLENGING PART OF YOUR JOB?

Sometimes we work with people in situations that can turn into violent situations. For instance, I received a call about a noise complaint. I knocked on the door and told the gentleman that he needed to turn off the music. He began yelling and insulting me. Seven of his friends came out of the house as well, asking "What's going on?" As the yelling escalates, I'm thinking to myself what I will need to do if it becomes violent. Then suddenly, a car pulls up with a woman in it who said, "Sir, sir, if you please leave, I promise you I will turn it off in 15 minutes." I said, "Okay, ma'am, fifteen minutes." I sat in the patrol car and waiting until everything was turned off.

That's just one of many situations where things could have gotten

WHAT IS YOUR BACKGROUND?

I was in the Marine Corps for nine years, five years active duty and four in the reserves. I was in law enforcement for five years afterwards. Then I spent numerous years running security for the Marriott Hotel. I retired from their in October, but got bored at home and found the Great Northwest.

WHAT DO YOU DO AT THE GREAT NORTHWEST?

My job is to put the safety of the community first. I go out there to make sure that the community is secure. We go on patrol and make sure that everything is safe and sound.

I get to engage with the community every day. I go out there and greet people. I'm not here to be a bad guy, I'm here for the community. We're on the same team. The great thing about this job is that I get to come and mingle with everybody.

I see residents who are furious when I approach them, because of the scenario that they are in. I calm themdown, maybe even tell them a joke. Before you know it, we're both laughing together and talking about it. Then we're able to find a solution together.

violent. Thankfully, my training with SAPD and the police also prepares me for some of those scenarios.

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE PART ABOUT YOUR JOB?

I really like my job. I like helping people and working with people. I taught a number of classes about interpersonal skills. Now, I use what I've taught.

Plus, I feel like I can help the community, especially if children are involved. For example, one day I get a call from a man on the phone saying, "You need to come out here. I've got a 6 foot snake on my porch." I told him to call 311 – Animal Control, because we do not have jurisdiction to handle that. He told me, "It won't let my kids out! They're right there." Since kids were involved, I decided to go out there. Sure enough, there is a 6 foot snake. I don't know what kind of snake it was. I told him, "I can try to help you get it." At first he told me, "No, no. It will go in the back yard." Eventually, I said, "Sir, bring me that trash can over here. Open it up." I went into the back of the truck and grabbed the gadget that you can pick up trash with. I said, "I will grab the body of the snake and I want you to lay a sledge hammer on top of the head and hold him down." I tried to put the gadget underneath the body. It started to sliver through it. I asked, "Are you ready?" When he told me he was, I threw it into the trash can and put the lid on it. I think a snake farm or other organization came out later to get the snake.

In this case, I shouldn't have helped since it was an animal situation, but I know that the children are okay.
